Shortly atterwards Chris Gilroy, our newest councillor and Mark Henry's neighbour, had to resign due to illness. We wish him all the best for a speedy recovery from his operatton.

Hopefully this summer will bring more posittve news for Fernwood. The school is on schedule for the completton of two classrooms before the September term begins and the south side of the village will have its roads adopted very shortly.

This year's project will hopefully be to try to get a more frequent bus service between Fernwood and Newark and to culttvate a better understanding with developers and OM management.

We need your feedback...

I think that we should be looking to start a "care in the community" project which aims to support our most vulnerable residents.Since the Parish Council has been working more closely with the Residents' Associatton things have progressed more swittly for the benefit of all so let us hope that this can conttnue into the future.In order for the Parish Council to deal with any concerns you may have we need your feedback, so please let us know what your concerns are.

The Parish Council has spent the last two years talking to providers of broadband and finally, after much pressure/lobbying, has had confirmation that BT will roll its 'Infinity' product out as far as Fernwood in October 2012 (subject to change).

This means we should all get a minimum of 16mbps and if you are on, for example, a 24meg

tariff, you should be able to achieve it. The maximum 'standard speed' anyone is likely to achieve is just under 60mbps, regardless of what you pay for in your tariff.

For a 'reasonable'* fee, BT will bring the fibre cable to your door and 100mbps+ should be achievable.

* BT would not be drawn on their definition of 'reasonable'.

Other providers will piggyback on the service, so Sky, Talktalk, Plusnet etc. will all offer the same service and speed.

It's another small victory for the Council which I'd like to report.

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Holy Trinity Roman Catholic Parish has been located at Boundary Road since 1979. The old church on Parliament Street was in service

from 1836.

The present site, which encompasses Holy Trinity Nursery and Primary Catholic School, Holy Trinity Community and Partnership Centre as well as the church, is a multtfuncttonal campus interlinking religious development, educattonal strategies and social acttvittes.

A series of talks and discussions are held on a regular basis for adults interested in finding out

more about the Catholic faith, otten leading to non-Catholics being received into the Church atter a period of instructton.

The Bishop of Nott ngham is the leader of the church in our Diocese and Holy Trinity Parish is a constituent part of the Diocese. The Bishop appoints a parish priest to care for the needs of the people. There is a real shortage of people interested in priesthood at present not just in the UK but generally in the western world. Building a successful and active parish community requires skills in facilitation, guidance and encouragement. Lay volunteers play a vital part in the life of the parish whilst recognising that the parish priest has leadership responsibilities.

We have a Parish Pastoral Team which is a

group of parishioners, including two young members, elected to serve for a threeyear period. They meet once every two months with the parish priest to facilitate acttvittes and events which encourage and support the spiritual and social life of parishioners. The Pastoral Team is currently engaged with the Diocesan Renewal Document called Living Stones. This offers an opportunity for

all parishes, deaneries and the Diocese to create a plattorm for sustainability and growth for the future. It also provides scope for the Diocese of Nott ngham to explore further Pope Benedict's call to seek ways of deepening social engagement.

The parish is a member of **Churches Together in Newark,** an ecumenical group representing 15

Christtan Churches throughout the Newark and Balderton area which meets every month to discuss and plan issues of mutual concern, joint acttvittes, services and celebrattons which take place throughout the year. All events are widely publicised and everyone is welcome; three parishioners serve on the committee.

> **Parishioners** are also involved in Christtan Aid, Justtce and Peace, and the work and ministry of Inter-Church families. The parish is committed to praying and working for the unity of all Christtans.

> We have a **Children's Liturgy Group** which meets in school term during the 10.00 am Mass on Sunday. This is a pre-First Holy Communion group for children 3 -7 years. The aim is to

help the children prepare at their own level to participate more fully in the Mass. Scripture stories are read to the children and they are brought reverently back to the church for the Liturgy of the Eucharist. Catechists are very important in the life of the church.

The spread of the good news of Jesus depends on people who are prepared to share their faith with others. The parish is always happy to hear from volunteers who are prepared to share their faith with children, young people and adults preparing for the Sacraments. This is very rewarding work and you do not need special qualifications to help. The Diocese does offer a number of training opportunities for those who wish to explore and learn about their faith in greater depth.

County Councillor Sue Saddington to the rescue!

At recent meetings of the Fernwood Over 55s Group it became apparent that some of our senior cittzens were in need of some benches to recover on their arduous journeys from their homes in the village to the London Road Bus Stop ...!

The Fernwood Residents' Associatton, in conjunction with OM, identtfied the need for a bench half-way from the centre of the village to the bus stop situated by the pathway on the green. This was put to the Parish Council at its open meeting. **County Councillor Sue** Saddington offered to provide the funds - £455 - from her allowance so that the bench could be fitted as soon as possible.

A Safe Walk to the School

At the Fernwood Residents' Associatton open meettngs in January and May, concern was raised as to the safety of the children's journey to the new

school as Goldstraw Lane would not be adopted.

On our behalf County Councillor Sue Saddington contacted County Hall and asked what was to happen. She was informed that the Design Team had met with NCC Highways and the School Travel Officers and in their opinion the pedestrian entrance is sattsfactory as it aligns with the pedestrian and cycle avenue. In the immediate vicinity of the pedestrian entrance to the school site the road will need to have traffic calming features. This is indicated on the developers' master-plan and comprises a sectton of widened road with a central island and rumble strips/ humps at each end. This area acts as the crossing from the avenue to the housing.

The positton of the vehicle entrance is OK, no special road treatment is required. Usual zig zag markings for the school are required - and will be carried out. Usual signs are required - and will

be installed. No pedestrian light crossing or flashing speed lights are required. No special speed limit is required as the road alignment should control speed.

There are no zebra-crossing plans as yet and the developers' master-plan indicates a number of similar raised central island measures at various points on Goldstraw Lane to provide strategic safe crossing points.

With regard to insurance, whoever is responsible for the road should ensure that it is maintained in a fit state and any claim would be against the person responsible for the road. Prior to adoptton by NCC this would be the specific developer for that area.

On behalf of the residents I thank County Councillor Sue Saddington for pursuing this matter on our behalf.

ERNWOOD CONSERVATION GROUP: HY DO WE NEED IT? By Catherine Parry

Next time you're at your computer call up Google Maps.

Zoom in on Fernwood and marvel at the technology that allows you to see whether or not you had washing hanging on the line the day the satellite went over, and, perhaps more interestingly, see what your neighbours have done with their back gardens.

Zoom out a bit. Now you can see the rough greenness of Fernwood's wildflower meadow, and the darker, shaggy humpy treetops of

its clumps and strips of woodland. Zoom out further. The wider

landscape resolves into a view of Newark, of the opencast mine to the south west, and acre upon acre of fields. It's an agricultural, rural scene but an industrial one,

nevertheless. It's a smooth landscape of straight lines, and there are almost no trees.

Now put aside the wonder of the technology that allows you to see all this and think about the ecology of such a ttdy, working land.

What lives in these fields? There is natural life hares, skylarks, beetles, cow parsley - but it's a poor ecology, and Newark's Growth Point plan will soon move even these on from the fields to the east of Fernwood.



As human development creeps onwards the woods and grasslands of Fernwood will become a ttny enclave of greenness, a little preserve for the plants, creatures and scenes we think of as natural

beauty.

It won't, however, stay that way without some help.

A beauttful landscape is always made from a rich ecology, something that will emerge



spontaneously if there is no human pollutton, damage or land clearance, but we live heavily on

the land.



In order to keep the rich ecology we have at Fernwood - the woods, the wildflowers, meadow grasses, hedgehogs, pipistrelle bats, stoats, toads, bees, rooks, long-tailed ttts, goldfinches, misty summer evenings - we must

protect what's here from damage and development, keep it clean, plant new nattve trees and wildflowers, and provide homes and habitats for those plants and creatures whose numbers are dwindling.

The newly formed Fernwood Conservation Group aims to do all these things in order to preserve our woods and green spaces for the sake of both the wildlife and the humans who live here.
