FERNWOOD NORTH UPDATE

As Fernwood continues to grow, the Parish Council is actively engaging with developers and local authorities regarding the future of the new areas in our village, particularly Fernwood North. This encompasses the vicinity of the Barratt David Wilson sales offices, Hunters Road and area around Phoenix Lane.

Currently, this land is owned and maintained by the developers. The Parish Council are discussing the potential transfer of ownership and is seeking detailed information

about the land and facilities that might be included, as well as the financial implications for maintenance. We've now had an informal meeting and requested detailed plans to understand the complexities. While we await updated information, please be assured that we are committed to keeping residents informed about any developments. Updates will be shared through the Gazette, at upcoming meetings and on social media.

FERNWOOD COMMUNITY CHURCH UPDATE



Our pastor Klaas-Jan is currently in northern Kenya to teach other pastors and church workers. These men mainly come from rural, wartorn South Sudan and so far, they've had little training for Christian leadership and preaching. The group consists of 19 students who come from different people groups and languages, so the teaching happens in English - the third language for some of them!

It has been a wonderful opportunity for Klaas-Jan to learn about different cultures, and how other Christians practice our faith in the same Saviour Jesus Christ in quite different ways and contexts. These lessons are shared with the Fernwood Church family. We are encouraged to see God at work in these far-away parts of the world too! In September, we had the joy of the first baptisms of Fernwood Community Church! 4 young people had become Christians within the last few years and asked to be considered for baptism. In the preparation classes we heard how they had courageously coped with being Christians in the minority at secondary school.

The actual baptisms took place on the Village Hall patio area in a portable, and heated pool! Family and friends came especially to support the young people. They shared their stories of what led them to commit to faith in Jesus and we sung some of their favourite Christian songs. Afterwards we all had lunch together. An encouraging day! Every meeting of the church is an opportunity to worship, discover more about faith in Jesus and support each other: Sunday, Thursday Toddler Group and regular home groups. VILLAGE HALL UPDATE

The staff team at the village hall have been working hard in 2024 to ensure the hall is profitable and continues to be a hub for the community. We continue to see an influx of party bookings, new groups and social activities at the hall which is excellent news for residents. Fernwood Village Hall continues to modernise - we've recently had an exhibition of local artwork on display, the gardens are flourishing and there's been many pop-ups in the car park over the year including cheese, bread and waffles!



We are making good progress on the leasing of part of Balderton Hall to provide more meeting rooms, business spaces and parking due to demand. At the moment, the building work is being undertaken to give users a dedicated entrance and modernised space. We expect this to have a really positive impact for all residents and users of the village hall, as well as introducing some new activities for the village. You will be able to book and pay online for your space at 'The Hub' and we are still hoping to be open by the end of the year. You can follow us on social media for updates.



PERSIMON APPLICATION UPDATE

The Parish Council held an extraordinary meeting in October to review the planning application made by Persimmon for 430 houses off the Great North Road. It was agreed to object due to significant concerns regarding highway safety, housing density, flood risks, and environmental impact.

The application does not address increased traffic from the new A1 services and Southern Link Road. Closing the left turn into Fernwood could force drivers to take a dangerous detour, especially if the A1 exit is closed.

Insufficient parking provisions may also create hazards. The proposed density raises concerns about parking and safe bus routes.

Parts of the proposed site are in flood zones, raising questions about the adequacy of drainage plans for sports facilities.

Noise assessments do not reflect peak traffic times, and there are concerns about adequate ventilation for affected homes.



The Council believes these issues must be thoroughly studied before any plans proceed. We are only consultees in this process and the decision lies with the planning department but we appreciate your ongoing support and will keep you updated on developments.

TRAVEL & TRANSPORT UPDATE

The Parish Council travel and transport working group recently met with County Councillor Lee to share data and concerns from residents regarding transport and travel in Fernwood. Recommendations were also made to Via East Midlands based on the survey we conducted at the beginning of 2024. The working group proposed hiring a traffic consultant to review their recommendations for validity, but this was declined. Instead, officers from Nottingham & Sherwood County Council will conduct their own assessments; please note, no formal requests have yet been made and this meeting was to discus recommendations and possibilities. Before making formal requests, we'll be sure to add them to a future agenda so residents can give feedback.

The working group suggested bi-yearly meetings with bus companies to enhance collaboration. This proposal was declined; the County Council plans to meet bus representatives in a year to assess progress and requested all feedback be communicated through them rather than to the bus companies. However, Fernwood Parish Council will continue its efforts to promote services for the benefit of residents. Suggestions to modify bus routes to include train stations and colleges were also declined at this time.

The working group suggested a potential zebra crossing on Goldstraw Lane to improve safety for children after reports from residents of speeding; this has since been declined by officers at Via East Midlands based on their speeding tube data, showing average car speeds under the limit. The working group has requested this data so we can understand maximum speeds of cars during the period which is the concern of residents. We look forward to hearing any potential alternatives Via East Midlands may have. A community speed watch program was suggested as an alternative which the working group will look into. Additionally, the introduction of an electronic speed sign on the Great North Road was discussed, which the working group will take back to the full council for consideration.

The working group raised concerns regarding the A1 slip road flooding; a formal request to Highways England would be necessary which will be taken back to full council to action.

The group also discussed the potential for introducing double yellow lines across various sections of Fernwood, which will require local research and support from residents however these are very unlikely to be successful if applied for.

The working group was advised to reach out to the District Council for access to the latest traffic reports and police data. Concerns about parked cars obstructing emergency services access were noted. Councillor Shepherd highlighted recent issues with buses navigating around parked cars on Goldstraw Lane, which led to an accident. Councillor Lee agreed to investigate this matter.

Finally, the working group shared concerns related to parking outside the school and increased traffic from the new Persimmon development. There is no confirmation a new school will be built in the new development, meaning more traffic would be expected in Fernwood.

Residents are encouraged to stay engaged with these discussions and to share their thoughts and concerns. Your feedback is invaluable in shaping a safer and more efficient Fernwood. Whilst transport and highways are not in our remit, we will continue to consult the community for thoughts on potential improvements as well as share information with stakeholders.

Dear resident. We are pleased to be writing to you again in the latest issue of the Fernwood Gazette, following on from our summer column about anti-social behaviour and car meets, local healthcare, and the wonderful young debaters we hosted at Castle House.

Congratulations

We're delighted to be able to share the fantastic news that three of our young residents have recently been recognised in the Newark and Sherwood Community Awards. Huge congratulations go to Elliott, Jude, and Seth for winning the 'Young Person of the Year' award following a nomination from the Children's Bereavement Centre. The nomination was submitted following their immense and hard-earned fundraising for the charity, raising over one thousand pounds to support this vital local organisation. We are immensely proud of their achievement and know that readers will be equally pleased and proud too.

Green Rewards

We have recently received an update report on the Council's green rewards programme, which was established under the previous administration in 2022. The Green Rewards App hosts a number of tasks and behaviours that residents can demonstrate and log to earn points. Two residents, one based on the most points earned, and another selected at random, are chosen as winners each month by the platform operator and become eligible for a £20 voucher. We spoke to officers about increasing engagement and the impact of this programme, and recognise that promotion is a contributing factor. As such, we are writing to make you are of this app and would encourage you to take a look, and who knows, you may learn something new or develop positive behavioural changes to lessen your impact on our local environment.

Kiddey Stones

Residents will likely be aware of the current administration's proposals to erect Kiddey Stones outside the Council's Headquarters, Castle House. Whilst we recognise Kiddey's important and impressive work, we are concerned about the proposed spend and selected location for these artefacts. As such, we have closely followed and fed into the consultation process carried out by the Council and await the analysed results which will be presented to the Council through committees over the coming months. Please be assured that we will continue to follow this matter closely, ensuring that our residents views are heard, recognising your priorities and preferences for Council tax spend.

The HISTORY of RAF BALDERTON – part 7 – 1944/5 Lancasters

RAF Balderton Research Group - Pete Stevens, Leighton & Debbie Topham & Colin Savill.

Following the departure of the last USAAF detachments on the 1 October 1944 Balderton reverted to RAF control.

1 October Consequent upon the handing over of Balderton Station by the IXth Troop Carrier Command USAAF to Bomber Command the 308th Station Complement Squadron USAAF departed. 2 October The advance party from RAF Dunholme Lodge arrived to form Station HQ and the advance party of No.5 Aircrew School arrived from RAF Scampton commanded by S/Ldr. E. F. Nelles.

3 October The main party for Station HQ arrived from Dunholme Lodge and the main party of the Aircrew School arrived. 4 October Both rear parties for Station HQ [from Dunholme Lodge] and the Aircrew School arrived and the first intake of pupils for the Aircrew School arrived from the OTUs. 14 October No.5 NCOs Training School arrived.

In July 1942 a Beaufighter unit, No.227 Squadron, was formed in the UK for service in the Middle East, however, on arrival at Aqir Palestine its aircrews were absorbed by No.272 Squadron and the ground crew allocated to No.10 Squadron. No.227 reformed at Luqa, Malta on 20 August.1942 taking over No.235 Squadrons Beaufighters, operating from North Africa in March 1943 it moved to Italy in August 1944 and was disbanded by being renumbered No.19 Squadron SAAF.

On 7 October 1944 the Squadron again reformed at Bardney commanded by W/Cdr. Ernest R. Millington with Lancasters (but no crews) from No.9 Squadron as A Flight commanded by S/Ldr. Chester and B Flight commanded by S/Ldr. Meagher from No.619 Squadron based at Strubby. The Squadrons first operation was to Flushing on the 11 October with three B Flight aircraft taking part, 3 more operations took place before the move to Balderton.

19 October Servicing Wing advance parties and the advance party of No.227 Squadron arrived from both RAF Bardney and RAF Strubby by road; 21 October Main party Servicing Wing arrived from Bardney and Strubby; 22 October 'A' and 'B' Flights Aircrews arrived by air from Bardney and Strubby; 23 October the rear parties proceeded to RAF Balderton.

28/29 October Eighteen Lancasters of No.227 Squadron took off at 2230 hours on the first operation from Balderton, icing and electric storms were encountered on the return journey. All aircraft diverted to Holme and Breighton landing safely.

30 October the Station Commanders remarks: The month of October was eventful for the station in that it returned to Bomber Command after being on loan to the USAAF for over twelve months. The early part of the month was devoted to cleaning, tidying and arranging the station in accordance with normal Bomber Command operational requirements. This involved considerable work in preparation for No.227 Squadron in their aircrew block, in fitting up the Watch Office, in constructing the Operations Room and the Intelligence Offices and in re-organising all the station communications. On the 10th of the month, Station Headquarters moved from the Administrative Site as shown on the plan to the Technical Site so that SHQ should be conveniently close to the Operations Block.

The station really came into its own with the arrival of No.227 Squadron. This is a newly formed squadron and assembled with its Squadron Headquarters and one flight at Bardney and the other flight at Strubby earlier in the month. The squadron could have operated on the night of its arrival had it been necessary but weather conditions prevented operations before the 28/29.

30 March 1945 Warning Order received from HQ No.5 Group that No.227 Squadron is to move to Strubby (55 Base) on 5 April 1945.

3 April The transport of servicing wing and armament equipment to RAF Station Strubby commenced. Movement orders for the Advance Party on 4 April, and Main Party 5 April were promulgated. 4 April The Advance Party departed for RAF Station Strubby, and the transport of servicing and armament equipment continued. The MT Company provided eight 3 tonners with trailers in lieu of ten coaches for the transport of personnel and kit.

5 April The Main Party road moved off from 08.30 Hours onwards. The Main Party Air took off in 20 Lancasters, each aircraft carrying four passengers and kit. 7 April The Rear Party arrived [at Strubby] from RAF Balderton thereby completing the move of No.227 Squadron in accordance with HQ No.5 Group Admin Instruction NO.1/45 dated 31.3..45.


The RAF Balderton ORB reported: Signal despatched to Headquarters Bomber Command; Headquarters No.5 Group and Headquarters No.56 Base reporting completion of move. The total number of personnel affected by the move to Strubby was 672.


The last operational mission by the Squadron was on 25 April when 3 Lancasters bombed Berchtesgaden, 3 other Lancasters aborted. The last mission before VE Day was on the 4 May when 12 Lancasters ferried ex-POWs home from the Continent (Operation Exodus). The squadron flew 815 sorties losing 15 aircraft in 61 raids; two further aircraft were lost in crashes. No.227 Squadron was disbanded on 5 September 1945.
